FEBRUARY NEWSLETTER 2024

Dear Members and Friends of Hope Community Presbyterian Church,

As we find ourselves in the heart of mid-winter, it's not uncommon to experience feelings of loss and even a touch of the "mid-winter blues." The days are shorter, the temperatures are colder, and for some, this season can bring about a condition known as Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). During these challenging times, we turn to the comforting words of Psalm 37 to find solace and hope.

Psalm 37 is a beautiful reflection on God's guidance, provision, and love, even in the midst of trials and difficulties. It reminds us that, like the changing seasons, our lives also go through various seasons. Let's explore some key verses from this Psalm and how they can help us navigate the mid-winter blues.

1. Trust in the Lord and do good.

The first verse of Psalm 37 encourages us to trust in the Lord and do good. When the winter months make us feel low, it's essential to remember that God is always with us. We can find joy by doing good deeds, helping others, and spreading kindness even during the darkest days.

2. Delight yourself in the Lord.

5. The steps of a man are established by the Lord.

Verse 23 reminds us that God guides our steps. When we feel lost or directionless, God is our compass. God leads us through the winter season and into the brighter days of spring.

6. Wait for the Lord and keep his way.

Verse 34 encourages us to wait for the Lord and keep God's way. Just as we patiently await the arrival of spring, we can trust that God's timing is perfect, and that God will bring new life and hope into our circumstances.

7. The salvation of the righteous is from the Lord.

Finally, verse 39 reminds us that our salvation comes from the Lord. In times of loss or despair, we can find hope in the assurance of God's ultimate deliverance and salvation.

As we journey through the mid-winter season, let us hold fast to the wisdom and comfort found in Psalm 37. It reminds us that even in the coldest and darkest moments of life, God's love and guidance are ever-present. We can find hope and joy by trusting in God, delighting in God's presence, and committing our ways to God's care. May the warmth of God's love fill your hearts and dispel the mid-winter blues, and may you find comfort and strength in God's promises.

Artificial Christmas Tree Fund

Our congregation is slowly but surely reaching the age of maturity. In other words, most of us are in our golden years and finding that things we used to do without giving a second thought are having us think twice, or perhaps thrice, before beginning a routine task. Nothing has brought this to the forefront like the acquiring, the decorating, and the dismantling of our church's Christmas tree.

This year, Judy and Claude Erickson volunteered to retrieve a tree from their land and haul it to the church. Once there, the tree had to be fashioned to fit into the sturdy tree stand. As you may know, decorating the tree begins with someone climbing the 8-foot ladder and creatively draping the tree lights. Once the lights are draped, the decorating commences – making sure to get some bulbs on those uppermost branches.

I was not there for the input of the tree, but I was there to water it and to dispose of it. John Pearsall, with the aid of his trusty little battery powered chainsaw, cut off the lower branches before toppling the tree with me holding onto the topple part and easing it down to the floor as it toppled. A mess of tree shavings remained as a trail of pine needles led from the sanctuary, down the stairs and out the door to his pickup.

With an artificial-pre-lit tree, we could forego the fetching and dismantling of a real tree and the angst of getting the lights on the uppermost branches.

At ½ price, a good pre-lit 10 to 12-foot tree can run up to \$1,500. This amount is more than we will need, which would allow us the flexibility to purchase other decorations we might want OR donate the extra funds to our Little Free Food Pantry: a win/win scenario, in my opinion.

Please send your donations to the office. Dawn and I will keep track of the donations on our "Artificial CHRISTMAS TREE Fund" thermometer, displayed between the sanctuary and the coffee room. A red donation bucket will also be placed there for you to toss in any extra change you might have on Sunday mornings.

May the spirit of Christmas be in your heart all year long.
